LSFYC member **Dick O'Reilly**, an employee of FEMA, has travelled to various disasters in the US to report on the conditions encountered. The recent series of hurricanes has kept him and his co-workers very busy attending to the matters at hand. Below are his recent experiences and impressions...

"When Hurricane Maria devastated Puerto Rico on Sept. 20, I had just arrived in Georgia, responding to Hurricane Matthew, which sank or damaged more than 30 boats in the Intra-Coastal Waterway at the border of Georgia and Florida. A couple weeks later I would be there doing a FEMA report about the Coast Guard clearing the boats and destroyed docks from the water. My FEMA summer had started in August in West Virginia for a small disaster in the northern mountain counties. In both West Virginia and Georgia, I was the only writer deployed by FEMA.

Fast-forward to 2 a.m., Tuesday, Oct. 24. After the roughest flight I can remember, I had arrived from NYC in San Juan, Puerto Rico, the only FEMA person on the flight, which was 3.5 hours late because of the storm-delayed departure. A cab took me to the San Jose Convention Center, which was lighted up but devoid of activity.

I had heard about the huge room full of cots. It was all true! I sought out an empty one, grabbed a sheet and a thin blanket from a stack of bedding, and tried to go to sleep. At 6 a.m. people were getting up and so did I. Welcome to Puerto Rico, which had been devastated by Maria. Power was out nearly everywhere. There were no traffic lights. The few hotels that had auxiliary power were full. After a 12-hour shift working amid about 100 FEMA External Affairs employees from many mainland offices, I boarded a waiting bus and was taken to a ship, the T.V. Kennedy, shown a bunk room, a luggage storage area, and the galley, where I would eat pretty good food for the next 10 days, until I could get a hotel room.

I had entered into a new world, at once terribly depressing, terribly exciting, terribly challenging and wonderful and awful at the same time. Every branch of the government was there. Many were here to perform duties they knew from their own agencies, but now doing them for FEMA. All branches of the military were everywhere. The Army Corps of Engineers (mostly civilians I learned) were assigned the job of installing portable generators in every village, town and city, while at the same time getting the remnants of the destroyed power systems repaired and working again.

Many teams of people were being distributed around the island to set up Disaster Recovery Centers in rented spaces. Those are the locations that people can go to ask questions and get information. As always, they were expected to register with FEMA before-hand by the internet, by telephone, of in person at a FEMA center. More than a million have registered. They already have received \$160 million in recovery grants. Local governments have been given \$440 million in public assistance grants to clear debris and begin repairing public facilities. More than 2,900 miles of roads have been cleared of debris. Hundreds of generators have been installed in towns.


There still are few working traffic lights, even in San Juan. Work will go on for years. It is the Northridge Earthquake times 1,000 or maybe 10,000. Workers are beginning to leave, including me.

I leave behind new friends and old. I leave behind the Puerto Rican people are friendly, patient, take their fate without complaint but with many, many heroic stories of survival when prodded a little. They will be tested to the limit as they recover, but I have no doubt they will recover. I will take with me memories of how one should handle trouble if it occurs."




