Let the racing begin...

Our HiPoint racing season gets under way next month with Shoreline YC hosting. March 20 is the date so racers get your entry forms in. Meantime there's plenty of local racing going on for fun and tuning up.

Sail boat racing presents a plethora of challenges, or problems if you want to look at it that way. I mean there's timing the start; there's knowing the Rules of the Road so when you're in a crossing situation and there's a game of chicken going on, you better know who has the right-of-way; there's knowing when to crack off or go hard to windward. And many more. It's a thinking man's sport. (All right - a thinking person's sport).

Let's look at the idea of "cracking off". Simply put, the problem or challenge is which option gets you to the next mark in the least amount of time. Starting with the premise that the shortest distance between two points is a straight line, does it follow that sailing a straight line to the next mark gets you there in the least amount of time? It's complicated but interesting because it involves a lot of factors, literally there's a lot of moving parts involved.

As an example, look at the tracks of the America Cup boats as they tack up the course to the windward mark and jibe down the course to the leeward mark. They're making as many jibes going towards the leeward mark as tacks going up. Going down wind, they could sail in a straight line at probably something like 10 to 15 kts while covering the *shortest* distance. Meanwhile, the competition sailing a zig-zag jibing course may be covering twice the distance but at 45 to 50 kts.

Yes, those AC boat are unbelievably fast, but the principle applies to our slower "displacement" boats as well. The answer is different for every boat. The skipper has to make an educated guess based on boat speed, pointing ability, sea and wind conditions, what the competition is doing, and many other factors, not the least of which is who he has on board that day as crew.

Of course racing is only a part of the *sailing experience*. Christopher Cross had a great record out a few years back - "*Sailing takes me away...*" And so it does.

Be well and safe everyone, and get some sailing in whenever you can.

This Old Boat By Frank Franco

Since purchasing the 40 year old Tollycraft 30 ft power boat 2 years ago, I have spent some time (and \$\$\$) in maintaining the mechanics and upgrading components in order to enjoy the boat and stay on top of the functionality. As with all boat owners, I want it to last as long as possible. Fortunately, the 2 big gas V8s have been rebuilt and are purring like 2 big fat cats.

But as with an automobile, over time, components wear out. Especially anything involving rotating items. Such was the recent case with a propeller shaft cutlass bearing. The bearing is the sleeve that resides inside the prop shaft support strut thru which the prop shaft runs thru. The bearing keeps the shaft aligned from engine to prop. The bearing is just a brass tube with a serrated rubber inner liner. The tube is press fitted into the strut. (see an example at right).



One day, while out in the harbor, I heard banging under the hull at the left engine. Shutting down the engine and heading back to the slip on the right engine, I thought that I had picked up some kelp. Once back in the slip, I called the diver to come at first chance to take a look and remove any obstructions. Two days later, he called and told me that not only was there kelp wrapped on the shaft but that the cutlass bearing rubber insert had been pushed out of the sleeve. &#\$#@! Now I have to get the boat pulled out to pull the prop and install a new bearing!

“...not to worry amigo!” the diver tells me “I know a guy who can install the new bearing underwater!” WHAT! So I call Bob Harris from *Pro Tech Dive Works* who tells me that he has tools and equipment to remove the old and install the new bearing without moving the boat from the slip. After determining the correct size of the bearing to replace, Bob shows up with his assistant (the diver) and hydraulic equipment that pushes out the old and pushes in the new bearing.

After removing the 17” dia (the size of a hub cap) bronze propeller, hooking up the jig and hydraulic pins to push out the old bearing, then reversing the jig to push in the new bearing, the job was done. However, the inspection of both props revealed bent blades! They being 40 years old, it was not unexpected. &#\$#@! Now I have to buy new props!



“...not to worry amigo!” Bob tells me “I know a guy who can recondition the propellers!” WHAT! So I call Gary at *Wilmington Propellers* who tells me that they can straighten the blades, balance and polish the props to a like new condition. Boat performance will improve as well he says.

I will get the props back next week for the diver to install and me to test.

There will probably be some other item to eventually wear out and have to deal with, but as long as one guy knows another guy that can fix it, all is good!
