The second of our two-race Off-Shore series was run Saturday, Aug 6. Five boats answered the Starter's horn at 1155 hours and were off on a 16-mile course under clear, sunny skies and a good 10 to 12 knot southwesterly breeze. After being tightly bunched at the start, the fleet soon stretched out to a more or less single file formation with *Dos Amigos Dos*, a C&C 110 skippered by Bob Hubbard of Seal Beach YC crossing the finish line first (see photo page 7). In

fact, Dos Amigos Dos captured line honors in both races but did not fare well in the hardware department on corrected time. Also participating was S/C **Tom Cornelius** on Belissima.

After the handicaps were applied the winner on corrected time was *Acapella*, a Cat 32 skippered by Dave Nastri out of Buccaneers YC in San Pedro. The overall winner of the series was *Renegade*, a Beneteau 38 owned and skippered by **Ben Smith**, a long-standing member and Staff Commodore of Little Ships Fleet. The Off Shore Series Perpetual trophy, a silver cup, will be on display at the LSF shed. Congratulations to Ben and kudos to the winners and a big thank you to all who participated in this inaugural event.

Capt **Kevin McQuiston** update: As I've mentioned before, LFYC member Capt McQuiston is planning a non-stop sailing trip around the world - non-stop meaning he's not putting into any port anywhere!.
